Fast Facts: Home Is Not a Safe Place for Victims of Domestic Violence

In 2020, The Boston Police Department's Crime Statistics recorded <u>897 Domestic</u> <u>Aggravated Assaults</u>. Still, more than half of assaults in the home are never reported to law enforcement.

* Domestic violence is stated as the direct cause of homelessness by 1 in 4 homeless women according to the US Department of Justice. Women with incomes below the poverty level disproportionately experience domestic violence.

* Dangerousness spikes when victims attempt to leave abusive relationships. Help is available 24 hours a day on the SafeLink Domestic Violence Hotline at 877-785-2020. Counselors help callers develop safety plans, locate domestic violence shelters and obtain legal assistance.
